NEW LIBRARY OPENS IN CHINA

On June 1st, Judith's Reading Room dedicated a library at Da Chao Shan Elementary School in China. The library was made possible through the efforts of Jared Fantasia, who collected over 2,000 books, and Daisy Girl Scout troop members who packed books from their home libraries. Donated in honor of Cathy Leiber's former boss and his wife, Dinyar and Aashish Devitre, the collection represents the spirit of friendship the Devitres extended to Leiber when she and her family moved to China for her work.



NEW LIBRARY OPENS IN THE PHILIPPINES

On July 2nd, Judith's Reading Room dedicated a library at the Magarao Central School in The Philippines serving 1,300 students from K-6. Melissa Klauser (center) contacted us to help her create a library of children's storybooks in English as her Peace Corps service project. She has organized three-day training sessions for librarians, teachers, and students on library usage. We donated 292 books worth \$1,406 to help create a culture of reading for fun at this school.

COMBATING "SUMMER SLIDE" IN THE CITY

JUDITH'S READING ROOM DONATES BOOKS TO THE GREATER PHILADELPHIA BOYS & GIRLS CLUB TO CURB "SUMMER SLIDE"

Some slides are better than others in childhood. The tall slide on the playground? Good. Summer slide? Not so good. "Summer slide" is the loss of skill, knowledge and motivation gained throughout the previous school year due to lack of practice over the summer. Researchers at the National Summer Learning Association have estimated that children can lose up to two months of instructional time, which is 22% of the school year. This loss lags down instruction at the start of the new school year as teachers have to take time to re-teach what has been forgotten. Additionally, students from low-income families are at a greater loss because of a lack of access to reading materials during the summer.

It is this particular problem that Judith's Reading Room seeks to impact with a donation of 300 books to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Philadelphia. The donation will give five books to each child.

"With these books we plan to encourage our young people to cultivate traits of a life-long learner," says Christopher Gale, Manager of Literacy Initiatives at Boys & Girls Clubs of Philadelphia. "We are committed to these young people and books are an essential tool to help us."

Judith's Reading Room and the Boys & Girls Clubs of Philadelphia established a partnership last year with the donation of five mobile libraries containing more than 1,800 books for five Boys & Girls Clubs in and around metro Philadelphia.

"We hope that the donation of wonderful children's literature will encourage these young people to read over the summer so that they can start school on an equal playing field in the fall," said Cathy Leiber, President and Co-founder of Judith's Reading Room.

It is fun to browse The Marquis (a collection of Lafayette student writing). I would have to say I'm most excited to read The Power of Now. It was recommended to me by a friend after it changed his entire outlook on life. Summer is as good a time as any to gain some spiritual wisdom, and from everything I've heard, this is an amazing book.

JUDITH'S READING ROOM TEAMS UP TO CELEBRATE THE LEGACY OF JUDITH F. KRUG


This September will mark the 32nd anniversary of Banned Books Week, and Judith's Reading Room is excited to team up with Moravian Academy and The Doylestown Bookshop.

Moravian Academy students and teachers are currently planning events to coincide with Banned Books Week, and The Doylestown Bookshop will host Scott Leiber, co-founder of Judith's Reading Room and Judith F. Krug's first cousin, for a presentation about Krug and the history of Banned Books Week. The store, located in downtown Doylestown, PA, has a Banned Books Week featured display each year.

Judith's Reading Room was established in 2010 in memory of Judith F. Krug, cousin to the founders of the organization. Judy was a librarian for over 40 years and served as the Director of the American Library Association's Office for Intellectual Freedom. In 1982, during one of the nation's periodic censorship epidemics, Judy established Banned Books Week, a celebration of authors, their literature, and the Constitution's protection of free expression.

In her memory, Judith's Reading Room donates libraries and ships books to people who do not have access to books in America and around the world.
